#### **Review It**

Pastor David said that this was a very familiar passage for most Christians. When have you heard this passage referenced or read most often? What has been significant about having this psalm read at the moments or times you remember?

How does familiarity with certain passages often impact the message of certain scriptures?

The focus of Sunday's message was the emphasis on the term **good shepherd**. What did you take from the descriptions of leaders and shepherds? Are there some examples that come to mind of biblical leaders who served as shepherds other than those listed by Pastor David?

Why is it seemingly so common for some who claim to be shepherds (pastors, leaders, spiritual leaders, etc.) to be so harmful to so many? The wolves and sheep warnings in scripture are clear, but what about wolves disguised as shepherds?

When David wrote in the psalm that God restores his soul, what comes to mind for you? Why is this so important?

- 1. What did you like about this week's scripture passage and sermon?
- 2. What did you not like or find confusing about this week's scripture passage and sermon?
- 3. What does this week's scripture passage and sermon say about God?
- 4. What does this week's scripture passage and sermon say about humanity?
- 5. Who outside your group needs to hear the truths from this week's sermon?
