SCRIPTURE PASSAGE: 1 Timothy 2:8-15

⁸ I desire then that in every place the men should pray, lifting holy hands without anger or quarreling; ⁹ likewise also that women should adorn themselves in respectable apparel, with modesty and self-control, not with braided hair and gold or pearls or costly attire, ¹⁰ but with what is proper for women who profess godliness—with good works. ¹¹ Let a woman learn quietly with all submissiveness. ¹² I do not permit a woman to teach or to exercise authority over a man; rather, she is to remain quiet. ¹³ For Adam was formed first, then Eve; ¹⁴ and Adam was not deceived, but the woman was deceived and became a transgressor. ¹⁵ Yet she will be saved through childbearing—if they continue in faith and love and holiness, with self-control. ¹

Review It

This is perhaps one of the most controversial and misused passages in the church, at least in the last century or so. When you read this, based on the way the wording is within the passage, what is your first reaction?

There are compelling arguments regarding how this passage affirms complementarianism in the church. Complementarianism is the teaching that men and women are equal in God's eyes, made in the image of God, but made differently for his glory. The complementarian view highlights the uniqueness of the genders and affirms how both male and female complement one another in God's service, leaving certain positions within the church for men only.

The other view is egalitarianism which teaches that Paul was simply constrained by Roman and even Jewish culture in this writing and that women should have every right to hold the office of pastor/overseer within the local church.

Full disclosure - our church teaches the complementarian viewpoint.

This is hotly debated nowadays among many who for years have held one view, only to be now questioning that. So, knowing this and understanding the impact of Medieval church history on gender roles (more egalitarian than complementarian,) the impact of the Reformation on gender roles within the church (more complementarian than egalitarian,) and the impact of women's rights movements within the last century, how does the local church come to an understanding of such? Where does inerrancy and immutability of the Word come to play?

There is likely more here in these verses than can be fully understood in just a one-hour gathering. Yet, believing God's Word to be true, the challenge is to see how he is glorified when what is written is believed and when believed, is acted upon. What do you see the as the biggest challenge in such?
